




The R score

The college performance rating, also known as the R score, is a method of analyzing academic records used by most Quebec universities to manage admission to certain programs with quotas. It considers the academic results of each student at college and how each student stands out in relation to his or her group.

Frequently asked questions about the R score

What happens if I fail?

A failure or dropout without cause cannot be erased from your academic record. This affects the calculation of your R-score.

When is the R-score updated?

At your college, the R-score is updated 4 times a year:

- October (to include summer courses)
- January (to include the fall term results)
- February (to include the fall semester for university admission the following fall)
- June (to include the winter semester for final admission to university)

What is a "good" rating R?

Most R-scores for a college file are between 15 and 35

- Between 32 and 35 (85% to 90%) Grades well above average
- Between 29.5 and 31.9 (80% to 85%) Above average
- Between 26.5 and 29.4 (75% to 80%) Score slightly above average
- between 20 and 25.9 (65% to 75%) Average grade




R-score: Wishful thinking to avoid

The R-score represents a big stake in your future. However, it can be risky to use strategies to try to position yourself advantageously over other students. These solutions involve risks to your academic progress, and therefore your professional future. Here are some wishful thinking to avoid:

- Trying to influence your R-score in high school
- Enrolling in a program to get a better R-score to get into your "real" program.
- Choosing a College thinking it will give you a better R-score
- Adopting a lifestyle that focuses on your R-score only
 - Remember that a balanced life can only be beneficial to your academic success. You know what you need to feel good: sleep, food, exercise, friendship, love, work, security, creativity, leisure, family, etc. It's up to you to determine which elements are essential
- Confusing your R-score with your self-worth
 - The R-score reflects many things, but it does not reflect the value of each person.

University studies

The academic year is divided into three sessions:

- Fall, Winter, and Summer:
- Each of these sessions consists of 15 weeks of study and courses are generally offered once a week.
- The summer session is generally shorter, and classes may be offered twice a week.

Student Category:

- Regular students: a person admitted to a program.
- Part-time general interest students: not admitted to a specific program, the person is enrolled in one or more courses related to one
 or more programs.
- Auditor: without being admitted to a program, this person is enrolled in one or more courses, but is not subject to the evaluation process.

The study regime

- Each activity (course, laboratory) is assigned units called "credits". Each credit requires approximately 45 hours of personal work on the part of the students. Most programs can be taken on a full-time or part-time basis:
 - Full-time studies: 12 or more credits per semester.
 - Part-time studies: less than 12 credits per semester.

Money Matters

If you wish to obtain **financial assistance** to pursue your studies, you can use the <u>Ministry of Education's loans and grants program</u>. This program takes into account the expenses normally incurred by a student and the financial resources available. This assistance takes the form of a loan or a bursary. Both forms of assistance are subject to maximums:

- A **loan** granted is guaranteed by the government. As long as you are a full-time student, the government will pay the interest owed to the financial institution that gives you the loan.
- A **bursary** is awarded when the amount of the loan is not enough to cover the gap between your expenses and your income. **The amount awarded does not have to be repaid.**

To be eligible for the program, you must:

- Be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident, or be a refugee or protected person status under the Immigration and Refugee Protection Act;
- Reside in Quebec;
- Be admitted to a recognized educational institution;
- Be enrolled in a recognized full-time program of study;
- Respect (without exceeding) the eligibility period or the debt limit;
- Be without sufficient financial resources to pursue your studies.



Money Matters

A program distinguishes two categories of students:

- Without parental, sponsor, or spousal contributions;
- With a contribution from the spouse, parents, or sponsor.

The following is an overview of allowable expenses:

• Tuition fees, living expenses, additional living expenses for single parents, living and childcare expenses for dependent children, and transportation costs (other than public transportation).

Other forms of financing:

- Loans and grants plan
- Employmentincome (your student job)
- Support from your family
- Scholarships awarded through another process, often based on the excellence of the applicant's academic record, student extracurricular experience, or special circumstances (Indigenous, disabled, women in engineering programs, etc.)






